Hi, my name's Alejandro. I am from Toronto, Canada, and my question is, have you
ever (dealt / deal) with racism or (sexism / sexes)?
And I've dealt with both (Ever / Even) being a man in the city, it's not
uncommon. This is more so an (easy / easily) question. Living in Canada as a
person of color, (racism / racing) isn't uncommon. While Canada's more
(acceptance / accepting), given that we have a history of helping people
(escaped / escape) slavery through the Underground Railroad in St.
Catherine's, that doesn't (meaning / mean) everybody is so accepting, of
(course / coarse). Now, Toronto is a more multicultural city, but racism, again,
it's not uncommon and (hateful / hater) speech happens. I have worked as a
tree (plants / planter), which has allowed me the privilege of traveling
(throughout / thorough) so many wonderful different (parts / part)
of Canada. And in these other parts of Canada, (diverse / diversity) is not
as common, and people aren't always as (family / familiar) with other
cultures, other cultural (practical / practices), and they're not as
(accepting / accepted). I've lived in places like Manitoba and Saskatchewan, and I
(definite / definitely) felt a little bit out of place, and that's okay. It's all a
(matters / matter) of how people kind of accept you into (they're /
their) communities, and they were still accepting, although there was different
(levers / levels) of (discomforting / discomfort) that I felt and somewhat a
little bit of unfamiliarity on (their / they're) part as to how other people
(interacted / interaction) with me. So, there are different (levers /
levels) to this, but it happens in (many / much) different forms and it's not
uncommon, but we strive. We strive, (anyone / anyhow).
